Even the MBA acknowledge the problem. Nylon blueys have been banned by the Plumbers and the ETU for years.

CFMEU policy is that all clothing issued must be made in Australia from natural fibre or retardant material.

There are options.
Brushed cotton
lightweight
waterproof jackets
are available if you

look. The old woollen blueys are still around and most oil-skin jackets are suitable.
